General Academic Policies

Advisement

In addition to the College of Performing and Visual Arts (CPVA) Academic Advisor, Stephen Wagner, each music student is assigned an advisor within the Music Department; this person is typically their full-time applied music profes

Sequential Courses

Students enrolled in any series of sequential courses, such as Music Theory, Class Piano, Music History, Conducting, etc. **m s recei e a leas a C** in a given course to progress to the next level and receive degree credit.

Repeated Courses

The Music Department allows a student to repeat a course (excluding applied lessons and ensembles) no more than one time (a total of 2 times to take the same course).

x A student may elect to repeat a course for grade change or improvement. The highest grade received will be used in computing the grade average at graduation with "E" (Exclude) added to all other attempts of that course (see exception below). Courses taken at other colleges and repeated at SUU will not qualify for change of grade unless the student can provide the Registrar's Office written proof from the appropriate SUU

Recital and Concert Attendance

All music majors are required to enroll in and pass Music 0990 (Recital Attendance):

- **x** Bachelors of Music 8 semesters
- **x** Bachelors of Music Education 7 semesters
- xBachelor of Arts6 semesters
- **x** Music Minors 2 semesters

This requirement is designed to expose the music student to a variety of musical experiences and provide a suitable audience for recitals and concerts. Each semester, a listing of officially approved recitals and concerts for Music 0990 will be posted on the departmental bulletin board. Each student will be responsible for attending twelve different events on the approved list, at least three of which must be events in which the student does not personally perform. For information about the current method of attendance-taking consult with the music faculty or the Administrative Assistant.

Purchasing Music

All music students need to realize that the purchase of music is important in building a personal library and is a standard of the profession. The student's applied studio teacher will assist each student in the proper selection of music for each student's individual library. Students who use photocopies or digital scans of music they have not purchased are breaking the law unless the music is in the public domain. Fines for breaking copyright law are considerable and put the individual, the department, and the university at risk. Students will not be allowed to perform a jury or recital without owning their music.

Admission to Teacher Education

All students pursuing a program leading toward a Utah state teaching license must apply for admission to the Teacher Education Program. The criteria for admission are listed under general Requirements for Teacher Education Programs in the University catalogue. Any questions regarding professional education course requirements should be directed to the College of Education.

Ensembles

General Requirements

Each music major must be enrolled in a major ensemble each semester until they have completed the requirements for their degree. The major ensembles are: Band (MUSC 3320), Concert Choir (MUSC 3360), Women's Choir (MUSC 3340), and Symphony Orchestra (MUSC 3380). Nor more than one ensemble per semester will count towards their degree:

Music Gateway

All music majors must complete a Music Gateway. This is a performance jury and interview that usually takes place in the spring, at the end of the student's second year of full-time study as a music major. Before taking the Music Gateway, students must:

- x have successfully completed a minimum of 60 credit hours
- **x** provide evidence of passing the piano proficiency
- x be passing their second semester of MUSC 2410 applied lessons (B or higher)
- x be passing MUSC 3070 (Form and Analysis) and MUSC 2140 (Aural Skills IV) (C or higher)
- **x** provide a portfolio and appropriate forms (which are found on the Music Department website)

Passing the Music Gateway enables the student to begin upper-level applied studies (MUSC 3410) and upper-level Music courses.

A student who passes the Music Gateway as a BM or BMEd student may change their degree to a BA without retaking the Music Gateway.

A student who passes the Music Gateway as a BA student and wishes to change their degree to a BM or BMEd must retake their Music Department Gateway - at the BM or BMEd level.

Transfer students wishing to matriculate at the Junior level of applied lessons (MUSC 3410) must pass the Music Gateway during the first month of their first semester in residence at SUU (if they have passed and transferred two semesters each of the equivalent of MUSC 1410 and MUSC 2410 with grades of B or higher). In these circumstances the student must also have passed and transferred the equivalent of MUSC 2110 and MUSC 2130 (Music Theory III and Aural Skills III with grades of a C or higher). Otherwise transfer students will take the Music Gateway when the required courses/credits for the Music Gateway have been satisfied.

The faculty jury will notify the students of their results, orally, at the time of their Music

- **x** completion of a group interview
- **x** a cleared background and fingerprint check
- **x** ACT scores at or exceeding the following minimums:

Composite score of at least 21, English 20, math 19, reading 18, science 18

or

Praxis test no. 5751—Core Academic Skills for Educators (required if the student's ACT scores are below the minimum requirement in any area)

x a 3.0 cumulative GPA. No course with a "D" grade is accepted for licensure, this includes any transfer credit. A minimum semester GPA of 3.0 is required from date of admission onward into the Secondary Education program. Students must maintain a semester 3.0 GPA. A lower GPA will result in probation. After two semesters of GPA below 3.0, admission will be revoked.

Reci als

Recital Requirements

- **x** Half reci als for the B.A. degree, the B.M. degree (juniors), and the B.M.Ed. degree (seniors) must be a minimum of thirty minutes of actual music and a maximum of forty-five minutes. Normally, two half recital students will present a joint recital. The recital will be presented in Thorley Recital Hall except under unusual circumstances, in which case the applied instructor will determine if another facility is deemed necessary.
- **x F Il reci als** for the B.M. degree must be a minimum of fifty minutes of actual music and a maximum of sixty minutes. Full recitals will normally be held in the evening at 7:30 p.m. (or a weekend afternoon at 2:00 or 4:00 p.m.). The same consideration concerning venue listed above also applies to full recitals. Degree recitals must be performed on the SUU campus.
- x Recitals cannot be scheduled during the last week of classes or finals week.
- x Students must use the Recital Checklist on the Music Department website.

General Policies

Staff accompanists are available to music majors and music minors for lessons, rehearsals, and performances sponsored by SUU contingent on the following policies:

- x A student who needs an accompanist should submit the Accompaniment Request Form to the Director of Collaborative Piano no la er han he hird Monda of he semes er. The student will then receive an email from the assigned accompanist with a schedule of lessons and rehearsals and the amount due (see the fee schedule, below).
- x Accompanist fees must be paid before fall break or spring break, depending on the semester. Students with outstanding fees will not be allowed to perform their jury and a hold will be put on their account
- x Accompanist fees must be paid before fall break or spring break, depending on the semester. Students with outstanding fees will not be allowed to perform their jury and a hold will be put on their account. Fees must be paid through the Cashier's Office (use code MUSPER) and the receipt given to the Administrative Assistant.
- **x** Music must be turned in no later than **fo** r_{th} **eeks** before a scheduled performance. Students must give all music **direc l** to their assigned acco
